
## **Moorefield Map**



## Living History: Self-Guided Tour

The Town of Moorefield formally dates to 1777 when the Virginia General Assembly passed an act creating a town on land owned by Conrad Moore. Trustees laid out 55 lots roughly centered on the present Main, Winchester and Elm Streets. The original town boundaries appear as a dotted line on the map at right. Still standing on Winchester Avenue are some of the early structures including the Higgins House, the Old Courthouse and the Alexander Home.

Visitors are encouraged to park in one of the designated parking areas or along one of the side streets and experience Winchester Avenue as it might have been several years ago. Where a home or church is open for touring, the key below lists the page number of where a detailed description can be found. Other structures along the route have informative temporary placards placed in front. Visitors may download a complete self-guided history tours that include brief histories of the properties from the Web at http://www.heritageweekend.com/map.html.

There are three Civil War Trail markers within the vicinity of Winchester Avenue: Olivet Cemetery, at the "top" of Winchester Avenue; McMechen House at 109 North Main Street, and the Moorefield Presbyterian Church at 109 South Main Street.
